Getting Framed

Frame selection is an important part of your work. You can't put just any frame around it. For example, a formal gilded gallery frame would not go well with a contemporary piece. Or an oil piece would not be complimented by a poster frame. Document frames don't seem to enhance any creation. But you don't want the frame to distract from your work either. So serious attention should be paid to the type of frame you select.

Framing can be an expensive part of your production. Professional framers can be costly, especially if you are matting your piece. Store bought frames are the cheapest way to go but you are limited to size and take the chance of duplicating other artist frames who also buy off the shelf. Some artist do not frame at all. And some buyers prefer no frame. These artists do not have to spend time with frame selection and have more time to create.

Reusing yard sale frames are another source. You can find some interesting odd size frames at garage sales and thrift stores. You can save a lot of money with these especially if they come with unscratched glass. These old frames can easily be cleaned up with a little scratch removal, wood putty or spray paint.

Adding mat to your piece can improve the look of your work. Mat cutters are easy to use and range from \$100 and up pending on size and attachments. Some cutters like Logan will even cut glass. Mat boards range in price like paper. Precut mats can be purchased but again you are limited to size. Bainbridge sells a range of acid free quality mat. Some mats have color just on the surface so when you bevel cut a white line will outline your creation. Cotton rag mat will give you color through the core. Textured or museum grade mats are more expensive.

The back of the frame should look just as nice as the front of the frame. It's a good place to put a little bio of yourself and contact information. Also note that most galleries will accept wire hanging only. NO hook hanging.

I do my own framing and stretching of the canvas. If my piece is big, I make my own frame. For medium to smaller pieces, I get my frames from the store or yard sales. I do my own matting. I'm not a professional framer but anyone interested in learning how to frame is welcome to come to my studio and I will show them how I do it.

Framing cost will be absorbed in the price of your piece. Doing your own framing will require your time. Do you want to use this time to create or frame?

The judge is Carmen of Carmen's Gallery. Judging will take place Friday from 3 - 5 pm. The reception and awards will be on Saturday, May 10th, from 1-3 p.m. with awards presented at 2:00 p.m. There are no maximum number of artworks to enter that fulfill the requirements. All artwork must not have won an award at a previous CAG May Awards show. We will accept all that space allows according to the show rules. More will be announced at the April 19th meeting. Artists in all mediums are encouraged to join in this awards show. We would like to see fiber work, jewelry, sculpture, glass, batik, weaving, ceramics, as well as paintings.

Exhibiting artists are asked to sign up to sit the gallery for a two-hour shift on Saturday or Sunday. Registrations are due by May 5th; no registrations will be accepted after this date. Artwork must be delivered at the So. Md. Sailing Assn., on Friday May 9th, 2014, from 12 p.m. to 3 p.m., unless other arrangements are made in advance.

CRITERIA FOR THE MAY SHOW

The following criteria will be used to facilitate judging:

- 1. Elements of design: Use of line, form, space (positive and negative), color, texture (visual and tactile)
- 2. Principles of design: Use of balance (symmetrical or asymmetrical), emphasis (point of interest), and continuity (how well through use of the elements the viewer's eye continues through the work of art towards the point of interest)
- 3. Mastery of materials and techniques
- 4. Use of imagination, inventiveness, individuality and aesthetic consistency

The following rules apply to this show:

- 1. There are 8 categories & Best In Show for judging. You may enter multiple categories but no piece may be entered in more than one category.
- 2. Artwork must be original and have been completed within the last two years.
- 3. Artwork must NOT have won an award in a previous CAG Show.

May Awards Show Judge

Carmen L.N. Gambrill has been the owner and gallerist at Carmen's Gallery on Solomons Island for 33 years. Her gallery represents internationally recognized artists as well as those from the U.S. and Southern Maryland region. Formerly an educator and teacher, Carmen has, since the gallery's inception, offered workshops, demonstrations, and exhibitions to her clients and the community in order to enhance their knowledge and appreciation of art.

After immersing herself in the art world for 30 years, Carmen finally decided to try her hand at painting. She now enjoys showing and selling her own paintings both in her gallery and through representation at Ariodante Gallery on Julia Street in New Orleans. Her love is abstraction, but as an artist and gallery owner she has a great appreciation for all painting styles. Carmen continues to attend classes and workshops both at the Art League School in Alexandria's Torpedo Factory, as well as other venues such as Santa Fe and Maine. More importantly, she continues to bring quality instruction to Solomons through the gallery workshops.

Carmen is an active supporter of the community and serves on the Board of the Solomons Business Association as well as the College of Southern Maryland Foundation Board. Carmen's gallery hosts and organizes the Solomons Plein Air Festival, an outdoor painting competition that is held yearly on the Island. Last year, more than \$5000 was raised for charitable causes by this event. In 2012, Carmen organized a cultural art exchange trip to Cuba. She took artists and art lovers to Cuba, where they painted, visited the studios and homes of Cuban artists, learned about the architecture of the island and the culture of the Cuban people.

In her spare time, Carmen is often found rescuing critters and has supported P.A.W.S. through her gallery for over 20 years. That has resulted in finding homes for four rescue cats in her gallery and five more at her home on Solomons. Her two dogs, Gabby and Gigi Valentine, as well as her husband, Matt, seem to take it all in stride.

Mary Pat Hollis, Basket Maker

Only human hands can weave a basket. No machine has ever been invented that can weave a basket. Basket weaving is the oldest indigenous art/craft anywhere and everywhere. It is this touch with our very ancient human nature that attracted Mary Pat Hollis to this art form. As Mary Pat began weaving simple functional reed baskets, her hands,

fingers, and soul felt a connection with

people from times
past and those
living today. As
a weaver, she
has explored
weaving traditional
American baskets:
Appalachian-styled
ribbed and market
baskets, Nantucket
baskets made from
cane, hand-hewn white
oak and black ash baskets,
those made of reed, American
Indian style baskets, and natural fiber



Mary Pat is constantly exploring new shapes and forms, materials, color schemes, styles and uses for her baskets. Although she frequently dyes some of her materials or paints original designs on select baskets, it is the love of weaving she most enjoys. She is never satisfied with using the same materials or creating uniformity in her basketry. She is constantly traveling to study with and study with some of the most famous and inspirational weavers throughout the United States. All of these encounters have given her the freedom to use non-traditional materials in her weaving as well as allowing her to try new and different designs. In her studio you will find many useful baskets of all sizes, miniatures woven into tiny basket necklaces, and unusual art pieces. As she weaves, a great sense of peace descends upon her. Her hope is that this feeling

> of peace and contentment is passed on to those who view, hold, or own her work.

One of Mary Pat's goals as a basket weaving instructor is to promote awareness of basketry as an ancient craft and art form. Another is to stimulate, firsthand, an interest of others in the dying art of basketry. Over eleven years time and over 1,500 hundred baskets later. there is still much to learn and share in the world of basketry. As an instructor sharing many tips, techniques and designs, she hopes to encourage new weavers to explore this art form which is the oldest in all cultures and in this way connect our past to the present.
