Now everyone can get ready for the show next month. Let's see if we can do even better. I'll see you there!!



# Tricks of the Trade

# Trade The Importance of Depth of Field in Photography

This month's tip comes from our CAG President, The Baron. His photos have won many awards. His creative eye and composition on subjects is fascinating. Most of us use a camera to collect details for a painting or to promote our craft. So thank you, Lonnie, for sharing.

First of all, let me define Depth of Field (hereafter called DOF). DOF is the part of a photograph that is in acceptable focus, front to back. While a lens can only focus precisely at a single distance, the decrease in acceptable focus gradually changes with distance from that point of focus until objects become blurred. DOF is controlled by the aperture of the lens you are using. Wide angle lens have greater DOF while zoom lenses have smaller DOF, even at the same f-stop. Smaller apertures (larger f-stop number) will give you greater DOF and larger apertures (smaller f-stop numbers) will decrease the DOF.

Why should we, as photographers, have a good working knowledge of this phenomenon? Well, it is used for creative control in our photographs. A painter that is trying to isolate a flower from the background can just not paint in the background or can paint it as large soft shapes so that it does not compete with the subject, in this case, a flower. Photographers don't have this luxury. They have three choices:

- Put a plain back drop behind the flower.
- 2. Leave the background to compete with the subject.
- 3. Adjust the f-stop of the lens to throw the background out of focus.

Choice three is the easiest to do and doesn't require any additional equipment. The photographer simply selects an f-stop that allows him or her to have the subject in focus while throwing the foreground and background out of focus and creating those soft fuzzy shapes that a painter would simply paint around the subject (See figure 1).

Have you ever been somewhere and see something you wanted to photograph but there was a chain link fence in the way that you could' get around? DOF can cause that same fence to "disappear" simply by using a larger aperture and getting close to the fence. The camera will simply not be able to "see" the fence and you can get the shot. DOF can be used the other direction to ensure that a landscape photograph is sharp from foreground to infinity simply by stopping the lens down to a small aperture (large f-stop number) (see figure 2).

Photographers using Point and Shoot type cameras usually do not have any control over the aperture settings of the camera. Some of the newer and top of the line Point and Shoot cameras will have aperture control. Photographers using cameras with interchangeable lenses have full control of aperture settings and thus greater creative control over their photographs. A more in depth explanation of **depth of field** and how to use it effectively can be found on the World Wide Web.

Their 9-yr old son, Christopher, also enjoys the craft, and recently won several ribbons at the St. Mary's and Calvert County Fairs for his tie-dye creations. When not working on tie dye or family projects, Mike teaches business and economics, while Virginia teaches computer classes at the College of Southern Maryland.

## **MATERIALS**

Wear clothing that you don't mind getting messed up. Chances are, you won't get any dye on them at all, but sometimes folks drop the bottles, or splatter, and you should not wear anything that is considered nice or expensive. We will bring white teeshirts, in a variety of sizes, but folks can feel free to bring an item of their own if they want to do that instead. As for the workshop, we will bring a handout with more details, but the one thing we like to stress is that folks bring items that are 100% natural fibers (cotton, silk, wool). They should also bring a box, bin, or something solid to carry home their creations

from the workshop, where their projects can lay flat and not shift in transit. We will bring baggies and recycled grocery bags to help with the transport, but boxes or bins are better. They should ONLY bring 100% cotton items, as the dyes we use only work on natural fibers, such as cotton. Any poly/cotton blend will NOT produce optimal results.

Thanks for the opportunity to work with you, we are very excited about it!
